REFLECTIONS ON JAMESTOWN

Representatives of the four Inns of Court were invited to Virginia, USA, in April 2007 to participate in a series of events marking the 400th anniversary of the founding of the Jamestown settlement, the first permanent European colony to be established there. Master Rix represented the Treasurer and was accompanied by the Sub-Treasurer, whose observations on this special occasion can be read below.

There are many places in Virginia that have not changed much in 400 years, especially the forests and rivers that branch from the Chesapeake Bay into the interior of this once wild place. With the reconstruction of the original settlement (abandoned within a hundred years for the elegance and greater security of Williamsburg eight miles inland), it is indeed possible to feel that you are experiencing the same sights and sounds as the original colonists did. Spring brings a clear light that dapples through the trees like a myriad of prisms, as enchanting now as it was then.

Another feature that has not changed in 400 years is the acknowledgment by just about everyone in America's legal profession that the most important thing those early settlers brought with them was the Rule of Law. Enshrined in the Virginia Charter itself and the early rules for the colony's governance, it was reinforced by the commitment of many members of the English Inns of Court, and especially those of Middle Temple, to see the colonial experiment succeed. A number went out to join the colony and by the time of American Independence and the drafting of its Constitution, several of the Founding Fathers had been back to study law at the Inns of Court in London. These were the links between our two great jurisdictions which have grown, flourished and cross-fertilised each other ever since.

To mark this legal friendship, the events, lectures and celebrations were led by our own Lord Chief Justice and the Chief Justice of the United States, John G. Roberts Jnr.

There were resonances with contemporary issues in Britain too. The Governor of Virginia had tried, unsuccessfully, to pass a law banning smoking in public places. As the home of tobacco, perhaps he should have known better. The sacking of six state prosecutors was causing a stir. Were they incompetent or was there a tinge of political interference? University students were worried that student loan companies were overcharging them. The largest, Sally Mae, with a debt book of \$20 billion, was in particular trouble. Law is studied at postgraduate level in the States and individual student debts of \$150,000 are not uncommon.

The final word, however, should go to the American Inns of Court Foundation, which was established only 20 years ago to promote within their legal profession all that is best from the Inns here. They were the co-organisers of a two-day "Rule of Law" conference at Richmond University and with over 500 chapters, and their own Chief Justice as a member, its influence is clearing being felt. So it was particularly fitting that a plaque commemorating this association with the English Inns of Court was unveiled at Jamestown during our visit. It acknowledges a most special relationship that began 400 years ago and has remained strong ever since.

The Dinner to the Universities was held this year on 20 March 2007 and was attended by 140 undergraduates (in law and other disciplines) from 24 Universities as well as 50 senior members of the Inn. Master Treasurer’s encouraging yet realistic speech on training for the Bar was very well-received. The Legal Academics’ Dinner was held on the 30 April and was attended by 90 academics, mainly from Universities offering undergraduate degrees in

law but also from some BVC providers. Master Treasurer took the opportunity to encourage the academics to inform their best and brightest students about a career at the Bar but stressed again the competitive nature of training for the Bar. His comments were well-received and an enjoyable evening was had by all. The E&T Department would like to thank the members of the Inn who supported these two events.

APRIL NP ADVOCACY & ETHICS WEEKEND

In April, the E&T Department held the first of its two annual Advocacy and Ethics weekends for New Practitioners at Latimer House in Buckinghamshire. The weekend was accredited for 17 CPD hours including 9 hours of advocacy training and 3 hours of ethics training and was attended by 54 junior barristers. The course allowed NPs the opportunity to cross examine real expert medical witnesses and to tackle a series of hypothetical ethical problems with the assistance of real solicitors. We were privileged enough to have Master Nice give the after-dinner speech on the Saturday night.

Following the dinner, the advocacy trainers were left very disappointed after being thrashed by the NPs in a game of giant jenga.

We will see if the trainers can regain the cup at the next NP Weekend in June! Overall it was a very successful and well-received weekend and the E&T Department would like to thank all those who gave up their weekend to help.

COULD YOU MAKE A GOOD ADVOCACY TRAINER?

The Inner Temple is in its second decade of advocacy training – not much in terms of the five hundred or more years that this Inn has been in existence – but in terms of advocacy training in the United Kingdom, a respectable innings. For years the Bar believed that advocacy was an inherent skill which could not be taught. If you had been deprived of the advocacy gene at birth, there was nothing that could be done to improve your lot. It took an Australian Professor of Advocacy, Professor The Hon George Hampel QC, to suggest otherwise.

Professor Hampel persuaded the four Inns that advocacy was a skill which could be taught, just as you might teach a child to play the violin or a potter to throw a pot. His method of teaching was akin to watching a musical Master Class; the “performance” was followed by analysis of what needed to be improved, why it needed improving and how it could be improved. There followed a virtuoso “performance” from the trainer of the new skill that he had tried to impart before the student was asked to try it again. The Bar was hooked and, as with many things, once we had grasped the concept, there was no stopping us.

Inner Temple is, we like to think, at the forefront of advocacy teaching. The course for pupils has been radically overhauled in recent years, our course for new practitioners extends to a really challenging session devoted to the handling of expert witnesses, and we are building a comprehensive programme of

training for established practitioners. The Inn has over the years relied upon on a very dedicated band of trainers whose enthusiasm for their subject never seems to wane. Yet the continuing expansion of our training programme, partly due to Bar Standards Board regulations and partly to our own commitment to provide quality training for the profession, means we need more members to train as advocacy trainers. Your commitment to the cause need not be entirely altruistic. Few practitioner trainers come away from a session without learning something about their own advocacy (or gaining a few CPD points!). I doubt that any of us come away from a training weekend feeling unfulfilled and without having enjoyed the company and enthusiasm of those who are to be the mainstays of our profession in the future.

So, could you make a good advocacy trainer? If it helps to allay fears, there is not an (honest) advocacy trainer who will not be able to fill a short evening recounting the demonstrations he has given that went wrong. For the trainees it is immensely satisfying to realise that even in expert hands things may not go according to plan, and teaches them just as much as the perfect demonstration.

Teaching advocacy is no different from teaching anything else. It requires a knowledge of the subject, an ability to get that knowledge across, a desire to impart that knowledge and an interest in the future of the profession. If that attracts you, we would be delighted to welcome you and train you to train.

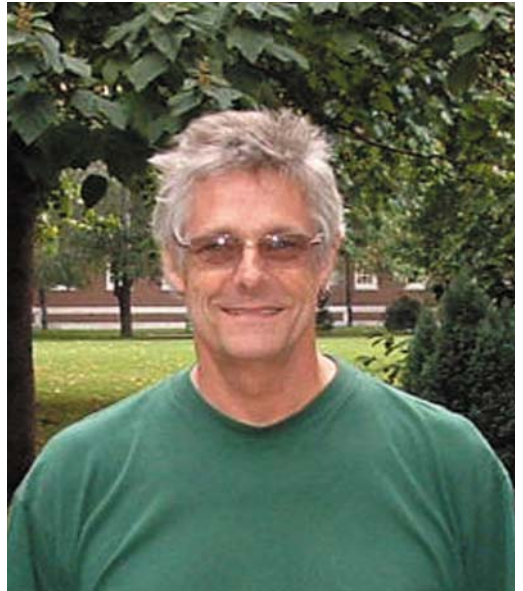
